Needs: For the City Council to consider the Planning Commission's recommendation regarding a rezone to bring the current zoning of three (3) City-owned parcels into conformity with the City's General Plan.

Facts:

1. Three parcels at the westerly terminus of Dry Creek Road are City-owned and were the former site of a wastewater treatment facility.
2. The General Plan designation for the three parcels is Public Facilities (PF). The current Zoning is Residential-Agriculture, Planned Development (R-A-PD).
3. The proposal is to bring the current zoning into conformance with the General Plan by establishing a Public Facilities (PF) Zoning for the parcels.
4. A Negative Declaration has been prepared in conjunction with this rezone proposal.
5. The Planning Commission considered the subject Rezone at their September 28, 2004 meeting. A verbal report will be provided on the Commission's recommendation.

Conclusion: The December 2003 General Plan reflects a Public Facilities (PF) designation for the three city-owned parcels. A "PF" Zoning would be consistent with the General Plan.

There are no projects or change of use of the subject property under consideration at this time. If and when there are proposals for the use of the three parcels, a separate environmental assessment will be conducted.

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RESOLUTION NO. 04-

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PASO ROBLES
ADOPTING A NEGATIVE DECLARATION FOR REZONE 04-009 - - CITY INITIATED

WHEREAS, the City's adopted General Plan of December 16, 2003 reflects a Public Facilities (PF) land use designation for three City-owned parcels located at the westerly terminus of Dry Creek Road (Assessor Parcel Numbers 025-431-003, 009, and 032); and

WHEREAS, the current Zoning Map has a Residential Agricultural, Planned Development (R-A-PD) designation for the subject parcels; and

WHEREAS, the current Zoning is inconsistent with the City's adopted General Plan, which is the land use policy of the City of Paso Robles; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Statutes and Guidelines of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), and the City's Procedures for Implementing CEQA, an Initial Study was prepared and circulated for public review and comment; and

WHEREAS, at its September 28, 2004 meeting, the Planning Commission held a duly noticed public hearing on the proposed Zone Change to accept public testimony on the proposal, including the environmental determination; and

WHEREAS, at the conclusion of the public hearing, the Planning Commission recommended to the City Council that the proposed Code Amendment be approved and that a Negative Declaration be adopted; and

WHEREAS, public notice of intent to adopt a Negative Declaration was given as required by Section 21092 of the Public Resources Code; and

WHEREAS, based on the information and analysis contained in the Initial Study and the attachments thereto, a determination has been made that the proposed Code Amendment qualifies for adoption of a Negative Declaration.

NOW, THEREFORE, the City Council of the City of El Paso de Robles, using its independent judgment and analysis, does hereby:

1. Find and determine that the proposed Code Amendment will not have a significant impact on the environment.

This finding and determination was made based upon the substantial evidence presented at the public hearing, including the whole record before the City Council (including the Initial Study, the Staff Report, the proposed Code Amendment, and any public comments or testimony received thereon); and,

2. Adopt a Negative Declaration for the proposed Zone Change.

2. PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The proposed project is to rezone the three City-owned parcels to Public Facilities (PF) to bring them into conformity with the General Plan. The site is the former location of a wastewater treatment plant. There are no land use changes or development projects under consideration at this point in time, and any future uses would be subject to a separate environmental assessment. Public Facilities is the land use designation anticipated in the EIR for the City's General Plan, certified December 16, 2003.

3. OTHER AGENCIES WHOSE APPROVAL MAY BE REQUIRED (For example, issuance of permits, financing approval, or participation agreement):

4. EARLIER ENVIRONMENTAL ANALYSIS AND RELATED ENVIRONMENTAL DOCUMENTATION:

Final Environmental Impact Report for the General Plan, certified December 16, 2003.

5. CONTEXT OF ENVIRONMENTAL ANALYSIS FOR THE PROJECT:

This Initial Study is on a Zone Change intended to bring the existing zoning of three City-owned parcels into conformity with the City's adopted General Plan.

6. PURPOSES OF AN INITIAL STUDY

The purposes of an Initial Study for a Development Project Application are:

- A. To provide the City with sufficient information and analysis to use as the basis for deciding whether to prepare an Environmental Impact Report, a Mitigated Negative Declaration, or a Negative Declaration for a site specific development project proposal;
- B. To enable the City as lead agency to modify a project, mitigating adverse impacts before an Environmental Impact Report is required to be prepared, thereby enabling the proposed Project to qualify for issuance of a Negative Declaration or a Mitigated Negative Declaration;
- C. To facilitate environmental assessment early in the design of a project;
- D. To eliminate unnecessary EIRs;
- E. To explain the reasons for determining that potentially significant effects would not be significant;
- F. To determine if a previously prepared EIR could be used for the project;
- G. To assist in the preparation of an Environmental Impact Report if one is required; and
- H. To provide documentation of a factual basis for the finding of no significant effect as set forth in a Negative Declaration or a Mitigated Negative Declaration prepared for the project.

7. EXPLANATION OF ANSWERS FOUND ON THE ENVIRONMENTAL CHECKLIST FORM

A. Scope of Environmental Review

This is a code amendment for a Zone Change that would be consistent with the expectation established in the adopted General Plan of December 2003 and the Final Environmental Impact Report that was certified in conjunction with that adoption.

B. Evaluation of Environmental Impacts

1. A brief explanation is required for all answers to the questions presented on the following Environmental Checklist Form, except where the answer is that the proposed project will have “No Impact.” The “No Impact” answers are to be adequately supported by the information sources cited in the parentheses following each question or as otherwise explained in the introductory remarks. Further, the facts, statements, information, and analysis presented are true and correct in accordance with standard business practices of qualified professionals with expertise in the development review process, including building, planning, and engineering.

ORDINANCE NO. XXX N.S.
AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF EL PASO DE ROBLES
AMENDING THE CITY'S ZONING MAP REGARDING THREE CITY-OWNED
PARCELS (ZONE CHANGE 04-009 - CITY INITIATED)

WHEREAS, the City's adopted General Plan of December 16, 2003 reflects a Public Facilities (PF) land use designation for three City-owned parcels located at the westerly terminus of Dry Creek Road (Assessor Parcel Numbers 025-431-003, 009, and 032); and

WHEREAS, the current Zoning Map has a Residential Agricultural, Planned Development (R-A-PD) designation for the subject parcels; and

WHEREAS, the current Zoning is inconsistent with the City's adopted General Plan, which is the land use policy of the City of Paso Robles; and

WHEREAS, at its meeting of September 28, 2004, the Planning Commission took the following actions regarding this ordinance:

- a. Considered the facts and analysis, as presented in the staff report prepared for this project;
- b. Conducted a public hearing to obtain public testimony on the proposed ordinance;
- c. Recommended that the City Council approve the proposed ordinance; and

WHEREAS, based on consideration of information received at its meeting of October 5, 2004, the City Council took the following actions regarding this ordinance:

- a. Considered the facts and analysis, as presented in the staff report prepared for this project;
- b. Conducted a public hearing to obtain public testimony on the proposed ordinance;
- c. Considered the Commission's recommendation from the Planning Commission's September 28, 2004, public meeting;
- e. Introduced said ordinance for first reading; and

WHEREAS, on October 19, 2004, the City Council held second reading of said ordinance.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT KNOWN that the Paso Robles City Council, based upon the substantial evidence presented at the above referenced public hearing, including oral and written staff reports, finds as follows:

1. The above stated facts of this ordinance are true and correct.
2. This code amendment is consistent with the City's General Plan.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF EL PASO DE ROBLES DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

The City's Zoning Map is hereby amended to replace the current Residential Agricultural, Planned Development (R-A-PD) Zoning with a Public Facilities (PF) Zoning for Assessor Parcel Numbers 025-431-003, 009, and 032, consistent with the attached Exhibit A.

SECTION 1. Publication. The City Clerk shall cause this ordinance to be published once within fifteen (15) days after its passage in a newspaper of general circulation, printed, published and circulated in the City in accordance with Section 36933 of the Government Code.

SECTION 2. Severability. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, or phrase of the Ordinance is, for any reason, found to be invalid or unconstitutional, such finding shall not affect the remaining portions of this Ordinance.

The City Council hereby declares that it would have passed this ordinance by section, subsection, sentence, clause, or phrase irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, sentences, clauses, or phrases are declared unconstitutional.

SECTION 3. Inconsistency. To the extent that the terms or provisions of this Ordinance may be inconsistent or in conflict with the terms or conditions of any prior City ordinance(s), motion, resolution, rule, or regulation governing the same subject matter thereof and such inconsistent and conflicting provisions of prior ordinances, motions, resolutions, rules, and regulations are hereby repealed.

SECTION 4. Effective Date. This Ordinance shall go into effect and be in full force and effect at 12:01 a.m. on the 31st day after its passage.

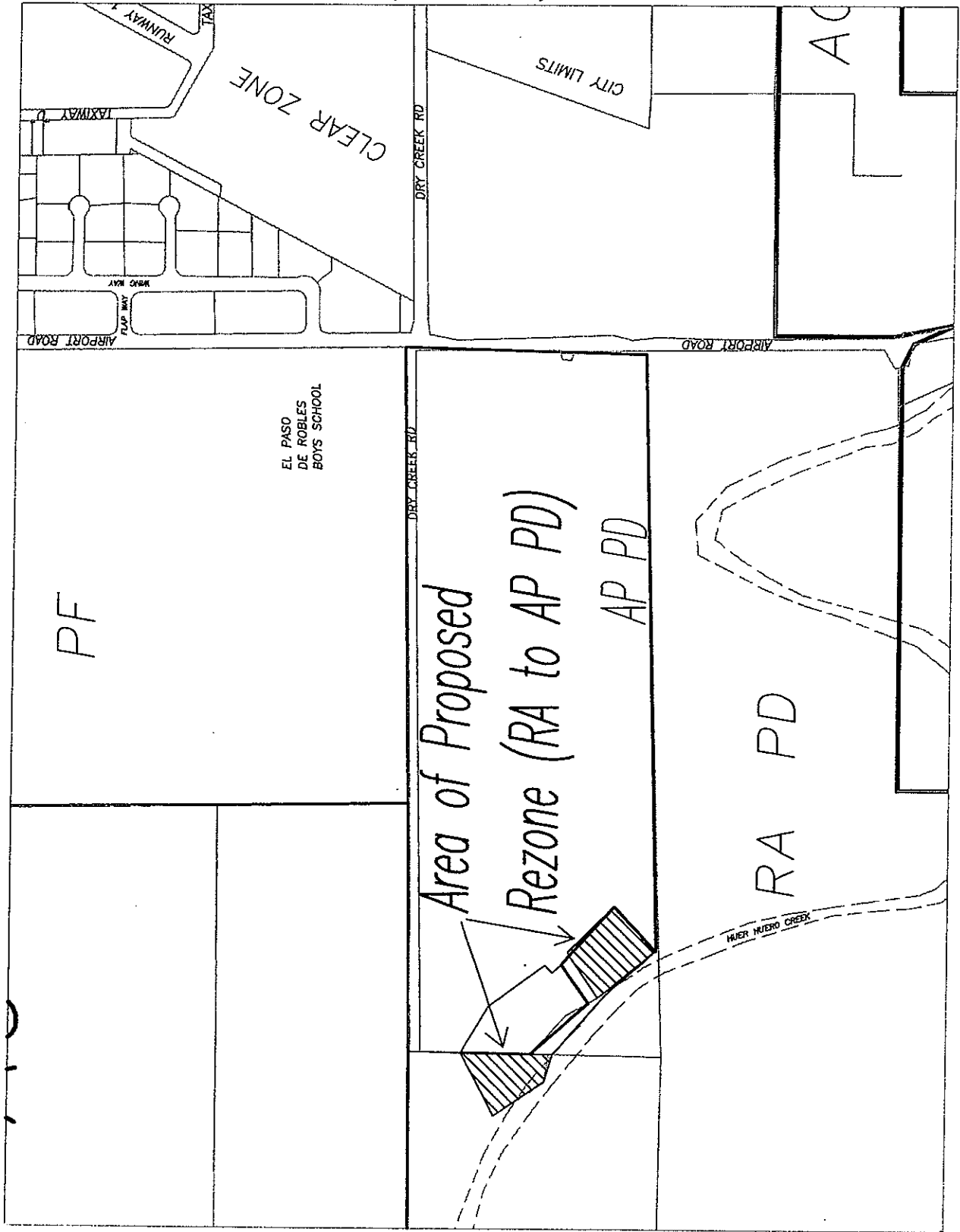
